Market Oriented Value Chains for Jobs and Growth in the ECOWAS Region (MOVE)

Strengthening resilient and sustainable value chains in West Africa

Context

With global and regional demand constantly rising, cashew and rice production and processing offer important potential for training, employment, and wealth creation in the ECOWAS region and members of the Organization of African, Caribbean and Pacific States (OACPS). This can be achieved through private sector development, economic empowerment of women and youth and supporting the efforts at minimizing the impact of climate change.

Rice is one of the most important staple foods in Africa. Local rice production covers only about 60% of current demand in sub-Saharan Africa. About 90% of locally grown rice is produced on small fields of less than one hectare, while most of the rural population in the rice-growing areas live at or below the poverty line.

The African cashew sector accounts for 62% of the world's cashew harvest, thus offering high economic development prospects for producing countries. 90% of the crop is exported annually to Asia for further processing, while more local processing would create jobs, especially for women and youth, and also reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Challenge

The opportunities for market-oriented value creation through production are yet to be fully exploited. The main challenges are located at the production level characterized by low productivity, weak performance at the input sector (e.g. fertilizers), weak adoption of good agricultural practices (GAP) and low degree of mechanization. Even though there are modest business management capacities on processing level, the competition for quality raw materials and the degree of local value addition is low.





The business linkages in general have insufficient supply chain management, inefficient logistics systems and high post-harvest losses. Moreover, the poor performance of the markets and the agribusiness climate are hindering private sector investments, specifically the weak (political) legislation and regional harmonization, poor condition of rural service infrastructures, utilities/storage and infrastructure as well as regional and national implementation capacities.

Financing is a vital factor but largely not accessible for all actors along the value chain – especially for women. There are also inadequate or unavailable operational and business development services (BDS), which would take into account and promote women in decisionmaking processes and levels.

Approach

With the merger of the Competitive Cashew Initiative (ComCashew), Competitive African Rice Initiative (CARI) and Resilience Against Climate Change (REACH), we put multi-stakeholder partnerships at the heart of our implementation. We aim to ensure long-term, sustainable results and competitiveness in the Project countries and all 79 members of the Organisation of African, Caribbean and the Pacific States (OACPS).

Resilience Against Climate Change (REACH) REACH is part of the EU programme: 'Productive Investment for Agriculture in Savannah Ecological Zone', which aims to increase agricultural income & promote sustainable economic growth in rural communities of the programme area by 2024.

Impact (ComCashew & CARI)

We build upon the wealth of experience and successes both from ComCashew and CARI. Therefore, we leverage income, locally processed products, yields using climate-adaptive farming methods and private sector investments.

Impact of 8 years of CARI implementation: **890,000 people** benefitted from a higher income and improved food security along the rice value chain. In order to be more resilient, **48,000 smallholder farmers** were trained in Sustainable Rice Platform (SRP) and 195,000 in Good Agricultural Practices (GAP).

Additionally, **172,000 farmers** have participated in Farmer Business Schools (FBS) and learnt to practice farming as a business.

Impact of 12 years of ComCashew implementation: Over **788,000 new jobs** were created in cashew production, processing, and trade, across project countries. Over **793,000 farmers** were trained on GAP and Farmer Business School from 2009 to 2020, resulting in higher productivity, diversified and higher incomes. **1037 Master Trainers** trained on the cashew value chain to serve as technical resource persons and change makers in the sector. An additional **€16.36 million** was invested in 51 matching grant partners working in cashew research, planting material development and farmer outreach.

Impact (MOVE)

- Farmer Training: MOVE continues to implement climate resilient approaches to improve production systems across its intervention countries. MOVE, since 2022, has trained a total number of 16,060 smallholder farmers in rice and cashew value chains to be more resilient in their farming activities.
- Support to private sector businesses. 43 rice and cashew processing companies across intervention regions are being supported through the Business Development Services and Matching Grant Fund to increase their processing volume and have conditions improved for creating value of products processed. Additionally, MOVE continuous to promote the local consumption of rice and cashew products and their derivatives.
- So far, MOVE has collaborated with 13 companies who have developed 36 products, of which 21 products so far are on the market
- Capacity building: MOVE, through innovative approaches strengthens the capacities of actors along the rice and cashew value chains. Through approaches such as the Cashew MTP, FBS, GMBS+, etc, MOVE has trained a total of 2,258 people from both public and private partners structures across its intervention countries to serve as technical resource persons and change makers in the rice and cashew sectors
